#### Arab Street and Baghdad Street

Arab Street which was designated by Sir Stamford Raffles as a residential area in the olden days, is now an important centre where multi-generational Muslims gather to embrace its culture and traditions. The first generation of shop houses are also found on Baghdad Street. It is now a buzzing economic area filled with import and export businesses and wholesalers selling textile and other goods such as oriental carpets, rattan products and apparels, which cater to the needs of the local Muslim community.



#### Julie Bakes

Julie Bakes is a modern bakery that offers a modern twist to traditional local delights. Get a taste of their Ondeh Ondeh churros, which is churros inspired from the traditional flavour of Gula Melaka (coconut palm sugar).



#### Kampung Glam Café

Strategically located at the junction of Bussorah Street, Kampung Glam Café provides a wide variety of Malay food and beverages. Get to enjoy Bandung, a rose syrup drink that is sweet yet refreshing.



#### Sultan Mosque

Standing tall at Kampong Glam, Sultan Mosque is the most prominent landmark representing the hearts and souls of Muslims in Singapore. It is a symbol of their religion, culture and history. Masjid Sultan Mosque traces its origin back into 1819 when Sultan Hussein, the first sultan of Singapore requested Sir Stamford Raffles to build a mosque. This explains the slogan 'Fit for a King' being associated with this highly elaborated mosque. Its intricate architecture includes onion domes with glass bases and crescent moon and stars that were contributed by the rich and poor Muslims then, which highlighted the Sultan's vision of having a community where everyone can contribute to.



#### Rumah Makan Minang

Tucked in the heart of the Malay heritage district next to Sultan Mosque, Rumah Makan Minang is a multi-generational restaurant specialising in Indonesian Minangbakabau cuisine that started out in 1954. At this restaurant, you will get to try different types of Malay kuehs to sweeten your taste buds.



#### Malay Heritage Centre

Residing close to Sultan Mosque is the Malay Heritage Centre that was built by the son of Sultan Hussein 160 years ago. It showcases the rich stories of the glorious past of the Malay community and meaningful artefacts that reflect the vibrancy of the Malay culture. This centre holds many cultural plays and performances as of today and is believed to be the core of many Malay cultural activities in Singapore.



#### Warong Nasi Pariaman

The last stop for the Malay Heritage Experience, Warong Nasi Pariaman is a cozy eatery that has been serving Nasi Padang dishes since 1948. End off the tour with a scrumptious meal consisting of authentic Malay cuisines, such as Mutton Rendang and Charcoal-grilled Fish.
