Clarke Quay

Clarke Quay is a historical riverside quay located along the Singapore River. It used to be the centre of trade where merchants used 'tongkangs', also known as bumboats to transport and unload goods for storage and distribution. Today, it has transformed into a bustling nightlife entertainment hub, filled with many bars and restaurants.



Sir Stamford Raffles Landing Site

Known as the founder of Singapore, Sir Stamford Raffles first landed in Singapore in 1819. The site is denoted by a statue of Sir Stamford Raffles to commemorate his arrival.



Fullerton Hotel

This five-star luxury hotel was formerly known as the Fullerton Building, and also the General Post Office building. The building was named after Robert Fullerton, the governor of Singapore from 1826 to 1830. The five founding tenants of the building include the General Post Office, The Exchange, the Singapore Club, the Marine Department and the Import and Export Department.



Esplanade – Theatres On The Bay

Due to its unique architectural design that resembles the durian (a tropical fruit), it is colloquially known to Singaporeans as 'the big durians'. Named after the nearby Esplanade Park, the Esplanade consists of a concert hall which sits 1,800 pax and a performing arts theatre with a capacity of 2,000 pax. It is also one of the world's busiest arts centres, with over 31,000 shows, 22 million guests and counting.



The Float @ Marina Bay

The Float @ Marina Bay is one of the world's largest floating platform and is able to hold a 30,000 pax capacity grandstand. It is a popular venue for various national events, such as the National Day Parade, 2010 Summer Youth Olympic Games and F1 Singapore Grand Prix.



The Helix

Completed in 2010, the 280 metres long DNA-shaped bridge is the longest pedestrian bridge in Singapore. Being the world's first in architectural and engineering bridge design, it has won several awards. A walk on the bridge provides a spectacular view of the Singapore skyline and when night falls, the bridge will be illuminated with impressive lights that highlight the double helix structure, creating a visual experience for visitors.



Marina Bay Sands (MBS)

Designed by architect Moshe Safdie, the MBS is an integrated resort consisting of a casino, a hotel, a convention-exhibition centre and a large shopping mall. It also contains a 340 metres long SkyPark with a capacity of 3,900 pax and a 150 metres infinity swimming pool, set on top of the world's largest public cantilevered platform. Next to it lies the lotus-shaped ArtScience Museum, which is designed to symbolise the welcoming hand of Singapore with its 10 fingers. It has showcased many international touring exhibitions from famous personalities and movies, such as da Vinci and Harry Potter.



Merlion Park

The Merlion is widely known as a Singapore icon as its body symbolises Singapore's humble beginnings as a fishing village, when it was called Temasek, meaning 'sea town' in Old Javanese. Its head represents Singapore's original name, Singapura, or 'lion city' in Malay. Sprouting water from its mouth, the Merlion statue stands tall at 8.6 metres and weighs 70 tonnes.
